

WHAT IS THE TRANSFUSION MEDICINE EDUCATION SYMPOSIUM?

The main objective of this educational event is to provide health care professionals in Ontario with up-to-date information on best practices in transfusion medicine. Ultimately, the goal of the symposium is to improve outcomes in patients requiring transfusion .

The symposium is delivered in partnership by the Ontario Regional Blood Coordinating Network and Canadian Blood Services.

The **Ontario Regional Blood Coordinating Network** is a provincially funded program whose mission is to inspire and facilitate best transfusion practices in Ontario through patient safety initiatives, education and utilization improvements.

Presentation 1: Anemia in the Bariatric Patient

- Describe what a rapid referral hospital clinic structure looks like so as to understand and potentially implement similar clinics or processes in any hospital
- Identify the role of dedicated referral services in minimizing unnecessary transfusions and increasing efficiency of diagnosing and managing anemia

OVERALL OBJECTIVES

Through attending this event, participants will be able to:

- Describe the unique aspects of iron deficiency anemia (IDA) in target populations including children, women with heavy menstrual bleeding, and patients post bariatric surgery
- Identify opportunities for oral and IV iron replacement with the goal of avoiding red cell transfusion
- Explain how a rapid referral anemia clinic could help minimize unnecessary transfusions
- Ascertain the challenges and strategies needed to treat IDA using case based scenarios
